




St Cuthbert's Junior School

Where Remarkable Educational Journeys Begin

Our Junior School provides the critical foundation for our students' educational journey from Year 0 through Year 6. Led by Head of Junior School, Felecia Tomich, our team creates a warm, caring environment that nurtures young minds while building confidence and resilience.

We embrace the High-Performance Learning Framework, drawing upon neuroscience and best research to enhance thinking at all levels. We take pride in our structured approach to literacy and numeracy teaching, which delivers significant improvements in learning outcomes.

Holistic Development and Support

Our comprehensive approach combines character development through our SERVICE values programme, and we provide leadership opportunities from Year 0. 'Big sister' relationships with Senior School students provide outstanding role models, while our Pohutukawa Learning Centre offers specialised support including educational psychology, occupational therapy, and speech language therapy on-site.

Small class sizes ensure our students have the support to achieve their personal best, with dedicated classroom teachers and learning assistants supporting learning environments. Extension programmes including Philosophy and Future Problem Solving cater to exceptional students.

Innovation and Digital Learning

Our 'i-Explore' STEM programme sees Senior School specialists collaborate with Junior School staff, where students explore robotics, coding, computational thinking, and engineering challenges. Through interdisciplinary STEM projects, students engage in scientific modelling, data collection and collaborative research. Students also learn online safety, digital ethics, responsible sharing, and digital footprint awareness.

As an Apple Distinguished School, we're committed to thoughtful technology integration that enhances experiential learning while maintaining hands-on experiences, including structured digital citizenship teaching.



Performing Arts Faculty

Inspiring Creative Confidence and Expression

The Performing Arts Faculty at St Cuthbert's College provides students with a vibrant and challenging space to explore creativity, collaboration, and self-expression. Across Dance, Drama and Music, our students are encouraged to think critically, communicate powerfully and develop a confident artistic voice.

In Years 7 to 10, students build skills in Music, Drama and Dance through handson learning. They explore movement, performance and composition, while engaging with diverse cultural forms and artistic traditions.

Senior students further develop creative independence through performance, composition and analysis. This lays a strong foundation for success in NCEA or IB pathways, with opportunities for Scholarship courses available in all three disciplines. IB Theatre, a two-year academic course that explores theatre as a global and cultural practice, is also offered.

Dance

Dance fosters creativity, communication and physical confidence. Students learn choreography, performance and analysis across theatre, social and cultural forms. They create group-devised pieces, study professional works and reflect on movement as storytelling.

Drama

Drama students explore the full process of theatre-making, from devising and acting to analysing live performance. Across all levels, students perform to invited audiences and collaborate across year groups. They study traditional and contemporary theatre, develop original scripts and build transferable skills such as empathy, confidence and critical thinking.

Music

Music encourages creativity, confidence and collaboration through performance, composition and analysis. Students explore diverse musical styles and develop skills in theory, songwriting and instrumental performance. Senior students follow tailored NCEA or IB programmes that deepen their understanding of a variety of music skills.

One School

We have a whole school ethos, and our programmes reflect this. Being part of a larger school means our youngest girls have opportunities to interact and be supported by older St Cuthbert's girls. Our 'Big Sister/Little Sister' programme provides our Junior School girls with older role models who are caring, aspirational and nurturing.

Across the school, student ambassadors display their leadership skills by having fun with their 'Little Sisters', ensuring they feel supported in their home away from home. 'By Love Serve' is at the heart of all we do at St Cuthbert's, and, in particular, our SERVICE Programme gives all our girls a chance to contribute to their community.

House spirit is strong at St Cuthbert's, with each student belonging to one House for their time at St Cuthbert's. The girls embark on a range of activities within their Houses, fostering a sense of belonging and connection to one another. Each of the eight Houses has a colour, and girls proudly wear their colours for athletics and swimming days, and other activities.



Wellbeing

Each student's overall wellbeing is at the centre of everything we do. Young people face many complexities and pressures as they journey from childhood to becoming a young adult and we ensure every girl feels supported throughout her time at St Cuthbert's.

Our psychologist, counsellors and deans are located in a dedicated Wellbeing Centre at the heart of the campus. The team provides guidance on the mental, physical, and emotional health of our students. Our deans, counsellors, nurses, and mental health practitioners work in conjunction with our teachers and families to ensure the overall wellbeing of every girl. By making it normal and healthy to ask for help, girls also learn that it's ok to reach out to others. They know what it means to care and be cared for.

Giving back is also an important part of our approach to wellbeing, and is underpinned by our SERVICE values and motto, By Love Serve. Students of all ages take part in service projects, both within their homerooms, Houses, and through collaborative community projects.

The College has a Chapel on site, donated by our Old Girls', and students take part in a variety of different services, from family chapels on a Sunday, to dedicated year group and special occasion services. These inclusive, values-based services support the spiritual development of students, families and staff, within our Presbyterian tradition.

Teachers in our Junior School benefit from strong leadership, collabortive teams and a culture that values open communication and mutual respect. New staff are welcomed into a well-resourced environment that actively support and promotes staff wellbeing.

Our pastoral care approach is proactive and age-appropriate, embedded in partnerships within the College community. Classroom teachers work closely with specialist staff to respond to the needs of every child.



Beyond the Classroom

Performing Arts

As well as giving students the chance to express themselves, Performing Arts can be credited for training imagination and building the skills future employers are looking for – collaboration, curiosity, risk-taking and an ability to think outside the square. Most importantly, the arts are vital to schools because they encompass one of the key qualities our students need for today's world – empathy.

Whether in an un-auditioned social group or at an elite level we are proud to offer music programmes for every girl including choirs, bands, orchestras and chamber ensembles. Many of New Zealand's leading Suzuki teachers work with our students and St Cuthbert's consistently gains awards and recognition in local and national competitions. Our co- curricular Music Programme is integrated into a girls' learning week from Years 0 to Year 13 and includes 30 co-curricular music groups playing a variety of instruments.

Students can explore and build skills through both our Drama Club and Theatre Sports and over 250 students participate annually in the St Cuthbert's Shakespeare Soiree, often going on to receive recognition at the SGCNZ Sheila Winn Shakespeare Festival.

Girls can take part in classical dance, Hip Hop, Korean Hip Hop, Contemporary, Tap, Jazz and more on a social basis with many groups being run in lunchtimes. St Cuthbert's dance pinnacles with "The Company", our troupe of auditioned elite dancers from Years 9-13 with a focus on contemporary dance.

Our Speech and Drama programme is led by experts who will impact valuable technical skills as well as greater confidence in our students in the public speaking arena.

Beyond the Classroom - continued



Visual Arts

The Visual Arts play a vital role in developing creative thinking, self-expression, and cultural understanding among our students. Through comprehensive programmes in painting, design, photography, printmaking, and sculpture, students develop both technical skills and conceptual understanding, while learning to observe, interpret, and respond to the world around them.

Our Visual Arts curriculum nurtures innovation and risk-taking in a supportive environment where students are encouraged to explore their individual artistic voice. Beyond technical proficiency, students develop critical thinking skills as they learn to analyse artwork, understand historical and contemporary contexts, and articulate their creative decisions. This analytical and reflective practice builds valuable transferable skills that extend far beyond the art studio.

Digital technologies are thoughtfully integrated into our Visual Arts programme, allowing students to explore contemporary artistic practices while maintaining strong foundations in traditional methods. Through exhibitions, competitions, and community projects, students gain confidence in presenting their work and understanding how art can impact and engage with wider society.

Sport

Sports at St Cuthbert's is about giving every girl the opportunity to be physically active.

As well as the importance for her overall wellbeing, we use Sports to help navigate girls through some of life's greatest lessons which are often learned when playing in a team. Whether she's playing sport socially or at high-performance level, girls will learn commitment and teamwork, as well as important life skills such as resilience and perseverance.

With more than 30 Sports on offer, St Cuthbert's girls can try their hand at everything from individual pursuits like Cycling, Tennis, Athletics, and Swimming to team sports such as Football, Hockey, Netball, Rowing and Water Polo.

Our girls have the benefit of a range of highly experienced coaches – many of whom are Old Girls who have competed at international level and donate time to coach and mentor our students, providing inspiration for future stars.





Experiential Learning

We operate camps from Years 4-9 which help build confidence and cement life-long friendships, building towards our month-long, residential life skills camp at Kahunui in the Bay of Plenty for our Year 10 girls.

Our teachers run incredible tramping trips throughout New Zealand. From Alpine treks to exploring the lakes of the Tongariro St Cuthbert's girls have many rewarding opportunities available to them.

The leading Duke of Edinburgh Award is accessible to all and our programme is very popular at St Cuthbert's with growing numbers every year. We support over 200 girls each year to work towards their bronze, silver and gold awards.



Facilities Development

St Cuthbert's school grounds seamlessly integrate the school's rich architectural history with some excellent facilities that support the development of every dimension of our students, and our ambitious campus planning and fundraising will continue to build on our rich heritage. The staged development will respond to the future, and will be focussed around the academic, social, physical, creative, and spiritual needs of our students.

Through the development of new, and dynamic spaces, our teaching environment will encourage collaboration and innovation, catering for both class and small groups, and support individual research projects, and diverse learning needs.

Our recent extensive building maintenance and upgrading programme has seen the roll out of modern and collaborative learning environments for students and staff, including the establishment of an Enterprise Hub where students can explore and develop entrepreneurial projects. Recognising the importance of play, we have also recently launched beautiful new playgrounds for our Years 0-8 students.

With a strong focus on environmental sustainability, our campus planning will deliver a harmonious landscape, with green spaces, outdoor play and meeting areas, and sun safe corners for seating, fostering our students to develop strong connections to one another.

Position Overview

This role supports the Junior School's strong music culture by teaching engaging, high-quality music programmes across a range of year levels. The Music Specialist Teacher leads classroom music, including the Year 5 and 6 Band Programme, and oversees the scope and sequence to ensure students experience a cohesive and inspiring pathway. The role works closely with Junior School and Performing Arts staff to celebrate students' learning, promote a strong singing culture, and contribute to co-curricular music through leading an ensemble aligned with their expertise. The Music Specialist Teacher brings the school's values to life through positive relationships, thoughtful planning and teaching that helps every student grow.
