Junior School

From her very first day at St Cuthbert's, we seek to ignite each girl's curiosity for learning, providing an exceptional foundation for learning through combining academic excellence with character development in a nurturing environment. Our unique position as a Year 0-13 school on one campus creates deep connections and learning opportunities, allowing us to witness and support each girl's journey from their first steps through to graduation.

Our commitment to academic excellence includes:

- Small class sizes with additional support during core teaching times
- Specialist Senior School teaching in Science, PE, Technology, and the Arts
- Dedicated GATE programme and extension opportunities
- Advanced literacy and numeracy teaching from specialist teachers across Years 4-6
- Weekly iExplore programme for all Junior School students brings curriculum to life with digital tools
- Digital learning and citizenship aligned with our Apple Distinguished School status.



At the heart of our Junior School teaching and learning

Academic Excellence and Innovation

Our teachers inspire curiosity and confidence in learning through their deep subject expertise and innovative teaching approaches. We continue to implement the High-Performance Learning (HPL) framework this year, reflecting our commitment to developing advanced cognitive performance in all students.

Holistic Development

Our Junior School provides a rich and varied environment that nurtures the whole child. Through our comprehensive Education Outside the Classroom (EOTC) programmes, students develop confidence and resilience while exploring the world beyond our gates. Within the campus, our purpose-built, age-appropriate play areas create spaces where girls can connect, play, and grow together. We take pride in our Year 5 and 6 Band Programme, where every student discovers the joy of learning an instrument.

Our digital citizenship programme ensures students develop healthy and responsible approaches to technology, while our extensive Music, Sports, Drama, and Art opportunities allow each girl to discover and develop her unique talents and interests.

Community and Support

The seamless integration of our Junior School with the wider college creates unique opportunities for growth and support. Our teaching staff work closely across Junior and Senior Schools to ensure smooth curriculum progression and share expertise. The special relationship between our older and younger students flourishes through our "Big Sister" programme, creating meaningful connections across year levels. In our classrooms, exceptional Teaching Assistants work alongside teachers to provide additional support and attention to each student. We offer comprehensive learning support and extension programmes to ensure every girl can thrive at her own pace. As our students prepare for their next step, our structured Year 6 to 7 transition programme ensures they move confidently into their Senior School journey.

Values and Global Citizenship

Our Junior School's foundation rests firmly on the College motto 'By Love Serve' and our SERVICE values, which guide everything we do. Through our Global Citizenship framework, we help students understand their place in the world and their potential to make a positive impact. We actively develop critical and creative thinking skills, preparing our students to navigate an increasingly complex world. Throughout their journey, we emphasise kindness, belonging, and respect, creating a supportive environment where every girl feels valued and empowered to contribute to her community.

Our comprehensive approach ensures students develop strong foundations while building the character, confidence, and skills needed for future success.





Our students thrive in a supportive community that nurtures leadership, celebrates individuality and prepares them for the futures they choose.

We have implemented our new pastoral framework in 2026 which sees all year groups in the Senior School being tutored in year groups with oversight from a Head of Year, who travels up with the cohort and supports day to day pastoral needs, and a Year Level Coordinator, who is a fixed point of expertise for all things pertaining to curriculum, EOTC and co-curricular activity appropriate to that year level. Complementing this horizontal structure is a very lively House system which spans the entire school, Year 0-13.

We place special emphasis on developing powerful voices, ensuring our girls are seen and heard. Through our focus on oracy, students learn to express themselves clearly, listen with empathy, and engage in meaningful dialogue. These aren't just classroom skills – they're life skills that will enable our girls to lead in their futures, whether they're presenting in a boardroom, advocating for a cause, or working in a team.

Senior School

At St Cuthbert’s Senior School (Years 7-13), we create an environment where girls feel empowered to take risks, develop their voices, and discover their unique strengths. It is important that we support every student to be the very best version of herself, recognising that every student matters and is known and valued.

Our academic programme is rigorous and challenging, designed to spark curiosity and foster a genuine love of learning. We attract the very best teachers and subject experts who engage, encourage, and nurture our girls to be the best they can be. Our culture of achievement isn't about competition – it's about each girl pushing herself to reach her own highest potential, whether that means moving from an achieved grade to a merit, or from a merit to an excellence.

From Years 12 and 13, students can choose between two academic pathways: the National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) or the International Baccalaureate (IB). In Year 11, we offer our own unique St Cuthbert’s Diploma. Developed by our curriculum experts, this Diploma offers a more rigorous curriculum than the new NCEA Level One, better preparing our students for higher learning.

Understanding that the world is changing at lightning pace, our curriculum goes beyond facts to develop critical thinking skills, adaptability, and resilience. We're preparing our students not just for the jobs of today, but for careers that may not yet exist. To support this forward-looking approach, our Head of Digital Strategy leads our strategic vision for digital innovation and ensures our students are equipped with the technological capabilities and digital fluency needed for tomorrow's world.

Our approach extends beyond academic achievement to develop every dimension of our students, nurturing well-rounded, confident and capable young women with the skills to be formidable forces for good on local, national, and international stages. Whatever a girl's aspirations, our approach ensures she develops into an adaptable, forward-thinking, lifelong learner.





One School

We have a whole school ethos, and our programmes reflect this. Being part of a larger school means our youngest girls have opportunities to interact and be supported by older St Cuthbert's girls. Our 'Big Sister/Little Sister' programme provides our Junior School girls with older role models who are caring, aspirational and nurturing.

Across the school, student ambassadors display their leadership skills by having fun with their 'Little Sisters', ensuring they feel supported in their home away from home. 'By Love Serve' is at the heart of all we do at St Cuthbert's, and, in particular, our SERVICE Programme gives all our girls a chance to contribute to their community.

House spirit is strong at St Cuthbert's, with each student belonging to one House for their time at St Cuthbert's. The girls embark on a range of activities within their Houses, fostering a sense of belonging and connection to one another. Each of the eight Houses has a colour, and girls proudly wear their colours for athletics and swimming days, and other activities.

We have three boarding houses, and each Boarding House caters for designated year levels. Girls move between boarding houses as they progress through the Senior School.

Students are supported by caring staff and fellow boarders including being assigned a ‘big sister’, one of our older boarders. These older students offer support, advice and connection while our new boarders are settling in with their peers. St Cuthbert’s Boarding offers a home away from

home with our boarding community forming strong bonds and gaining fantastic lifelong skills.

The Boarding House offers a structured Prep Programme in the evenings to enable students to complete their homework and study for assessments and examinations. Through the activities we provide, from weekly dinners to weekend activities, the girls also have much-needed down time and quickly become part of a tight-knit family. Each term there is a comprehensive programme of onsite and offsite activities for the Boarders to enjoy.

Boarding

Our Boarding Houses sit at the heart of our campus, and we welcome students from New Zealand and around the world. Our Boarders grow up alongside one another and develop amazing friendships, confidence, independence and a sense of lasting sisterhood.

St Cuthbert’s provides three Boarding options:

Full Boarding

Boarders remain at the school during the weekend, with the option of taking leave on any weekend.

Weekly Boarding

Boarders return home during the weekend, with the option of remaining in boarding during the weekend if needed.

Flexi Boarding

Day students stay as temporary boarders (short stays if parents are away or when girls have school commitments out of hours).





Kahunui

One of only a handful of schools in New Zealand to offer an outdoor second campus, St Cuthbert's gives every Year 10 girl an extraordinary gift: 26 days at Kahunui in the beautiful Bay of Plenty - off the grid, in a stunning natural setting, living and learning by turning the environment into our classroom. It is, by every measure, a cornerstone of a St Cuthbert's education.

Students are placed in their Kahunui group at the beginning of the academic year. There are nine intakes across the year, each made up of 24 students living together in houses of eight, each house with its own kitchen, dining area, bathroom, and laundry.

There are no phones, no screens, and no digital distractions. In their place: life skills, deep connections with one another, and genuine personal growth learning how to live and work together.

From the first day, students begin their journey to take meaningful responsibility for their own lives, preparing for activities, planning and cooking meals using a dedicated

Kahunui cookbook, managing their own daily chores and learning to navigate communal living with patience and generosity. Two tutor teachers per house guide their burgeoning independence skills in the early days, gradually stepping back as confidence and capability grow. Girls deepen their interpersonal skills to build a functioning group of housemates. Shared dinners in the communal dining hall bring the whole group together with the full Kahunui team. Evenings are filled with a rich programme of group activities, from music and games nights in the round room to campfire gatherings and shared reflection, creating the kind of spontaneous, screen-free fun that bonds a group of girls for life.



A Rare and Valuable Disconnection

In an increasingly connected world, Kahunui offers something increasingly rare - complete disconnection from mobile phones and digital distractions during one of the most formative periods of a young woman's life. Without screens, authentic connections flourish. Girls discover who they are when no one is watching, what they are capable of when no one is recording, and what it means to be genuinely present.



Experiential learning

Our classrooms at Kahunui have a clear teaching and learning focus set up to embed practical learning in spaces that reflect the outdoor environment surrounding them. The programme is aligned with the New Zealand curriculum, developing students' key competencies.

Our social studies programme uses inquiry and project-based learning to deepen understanding of sustainability, place, and community. Students develop literacy through journalling, learn about nutrition, and create a genuinely positive relationship with physical activity - all within a rich sustainability education woven through the programme.





Beyond the Classroom

Our co-curricular programme extends learning beyond the classroom, offering students opportunities to explore their passions, develop new skills, and build lasting friendships

Performing Arts

As well as giving students the chance to express themselves, Performing Arts can be credited for training imagination and building the skills future employers are looking for – collaboration, curiosity, risk-taking and an ability to think outside the square. Most importantly, the arts are vital to schools because they encompass one of the key qualities our students need for today's world – empathy.

Whether in an un-auditioned social group or at an elite level we are proud to offer music programmes for every girl including choirs, bands, orchestras and chamber ensembles. Many of New Zealand's leading Suzuki teachers work with our students and St Cuthbert's consistently gains awards and recognition in local and national competitions. Our co-curricular Music Programme is integrated into a girls' learning week from Years 0 to Year 13 and includes 30 co-curricular music groups playing a variety of instruments.

Students can explore and build skills through both our Drama Club and Theatre Sports and over 250 students participate annually in the St Cuthbert's Shakespeare Soiree, often going on to receive recognition at the SGCNZ Sheila Winn Shakespeare Festival.

Girls can take part in classical dance, Hip Hop, Korean Hip Hop, Contemporary, Tap, Jazz and more on a social basis with many groups being run in lunchtimes. St Cuthbert's dance pinnacles with "The Company", our troupe of auditioned elite dancers from Years 9-13 with a focus on contemporary dance.

Our Speech and Drama programme is led by experts who will impact valuable technical skills as well as greater confidence in our students in the public speaking arena.

Cultural Groups

Cultural engagement is of great importance at St Cuthbert's, recognised through 16 senior cultural groups, multiple kapa haka groups, festivals like Pōhāia and Polyfest, language weeks, and celebrations including Lunar New Year. Mihi whakatau ceremonies welcome new families, fostering cross-cultural understanding.



Sport

Sports at St Cuthbert's is about giving every girl the opportunity to be physically active.

As well as the importance for her overall wellbeing, we use Sports to help navigate girls through some of life's greatest lessons which are often learned when playing in a team. Whether she's playing sport socially or at high-performance level, girls will learn commitment and teamwork, as well as important life skills such as resilience and perseverance.

With more than 30 Sports on offer, St Cuthbert's girls can try their hand at everything from individual pursuits like Cycling, Tennis, Athletics, and Swimming to team sports such as Football, Hockey, Netball, Rowing and Water Polo.

Our girls have the benefit of a range of highly experienced coaches – many of whom are Old Girls who have competed at international level and donate time to coach and mentor our students, providing inspiration for future stars.





Performing Arts Centre

Facilities

St Cuthbert's school grounds seamlessly integrate the school's rich architectural history with some excellent facilities that support the development of every dimension of our students, and our campus planning and fundraising will continue to build on our rich heritage.

Our recent extensive building maintenance and upgrade programme has seen the roll out of modern and collaborative learning environments for students and staff, including new classroom facilities at Kahunui as well as the establishment of an Enterprise Hub where students can explore and develop entrepreneurial projects. Recognising the importance of play, we have also recently launched beautiful new playgrounds for our Years 0-8 students.

With a strong focus on environmental sustainability, our campus planning delivers a harmonious landscape, with green spaces, outdoor play and meeting areas, and sun safe corners for seating, fostering our students to develop strong connections to one another.

Position Overview

The Teacher – Visual Arts is responsible for delivering engaging, high-quality Visual Arts education that inspires students to develop their creativity, critical thinking and artistic practice. The role involves planning and delivering effective learning programmes, fostering a positive and inclusive classroom environment, and supporting students to achieve their academic and creative potential.

Key Accountabilities

Teaching
